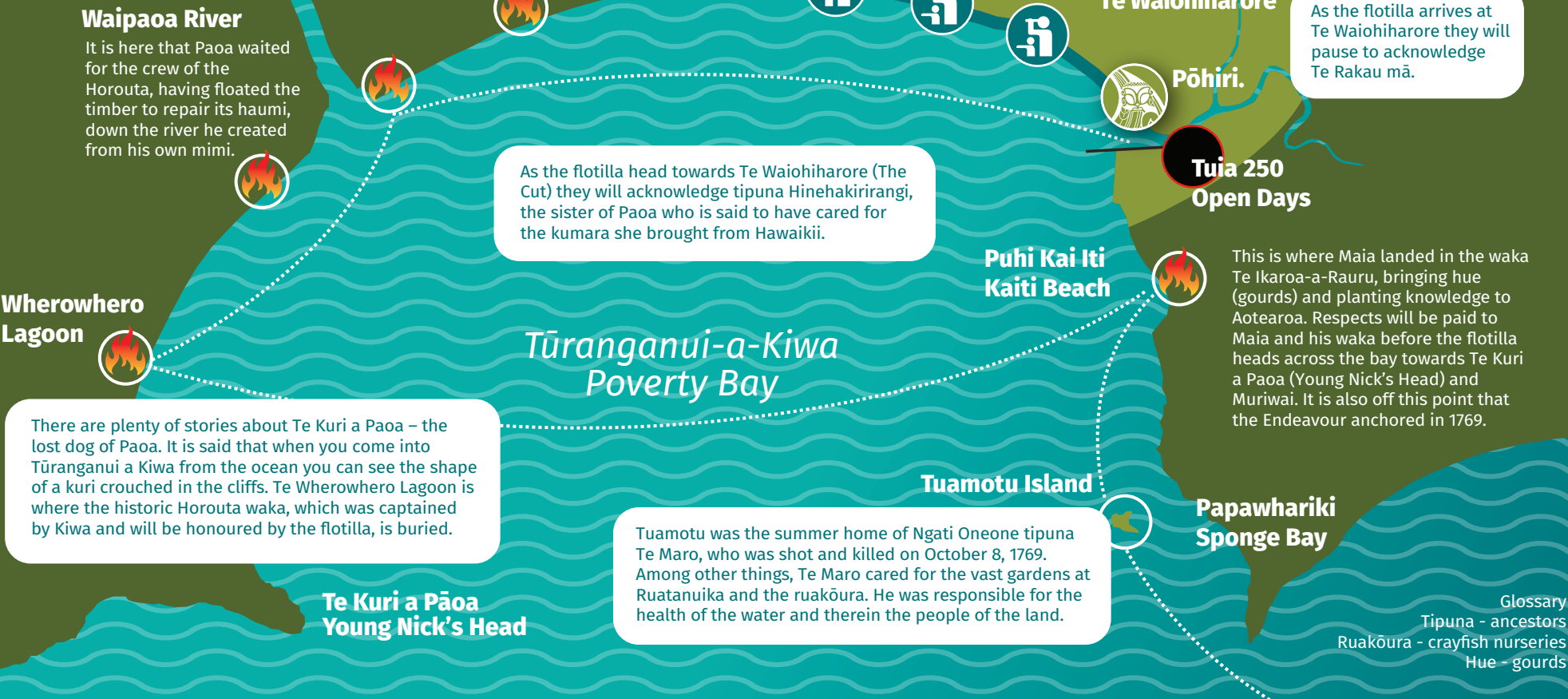

## Tuia 250 ki Tūranga - Weaving our Story

Last October, Archbishop Donald Tamihere summed up the importance of the Tuia 250 kaupapa beautifully in our dawn karakia. We can't think of a better way to describe what it is we are trying to achieve over the coming months. So, we will leave the last word to him.

*"When we tell stories of our origin and identity, of inspiration and purpose – we arrive at moments of unity. We arrive at moments of togetherness, because we're hearing your story and my story."*

*"That's why it's so important that as we begin to gain momentum in this kaupapa, Tuia 250, that we take the time to listen to the stories that need to be told. In all of their honesty and their truthfulness. But also, in a manner and in a way that leaves us with something quite special as a result of hearing those stories."*

*"There's a lot to marvel at, a lot to be discovered in the telling of our stories. And it's important that we tell those stories with honesty, with truth and with grace so that we can find out exactly who we are, where we come from, and in a way, what we're meant to be doing."*

*"It's important that the children of Makauri learn the stories of the children of Kaiti. It's important that the children of Makorori and Wainui learn the stories of the children of Elgin and beyond. It's important that the children of Captain James Cook learn the stories of the children of Kiwa and Pāoa so that in Tairāwhiti we won't just exist as a divided people – my story over here and your story over there. But that they may all be one. And the way to do that is to tell our stories, so that my story and your story, become our story."*
